

A Book You Cannot Pass By

A book very much worth your money, draws together two important concepts: the Rule of 1223, which we studied and celebrated at our Unity Day in Kokomo in August, and the various celebrations of Greccio which still are before us in December throughout our Region.

The recently published "Celebrating Life: The Rule and Christmas at Greccio (1223-2023)" by Friar Martin Carbajo-Nunez, OFM,

would be an excellent choice bringing the theologies of these two events together. TAU Publications has scored BIG time in offering us this volume at exactly the right time to help us see the connection between these two major events in the life of St. Francis — the Crib and the Cross.

Listening: Can You Hear Me Now?



Bishop Barron has been offering summaries of the content of the discussion at the Synod taking place in Rome. In one of his communications, he shared the following about the his desire "for a church that goes out from itself". This

surely seems like an echo of what Jesus himself commanded his disciples, namely, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age (Matt 28:18-20)."

In describing the work of the Synod, Bishop Barron wrote:

"The Synod will be about all of us—clergy and laity—walking together (*syn-hodo*s, "on the way with" in Greek) under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. In this measure, the synod will be very much in continuity with Vatican II's universal call to holiness and the consistent post conciliar emphasis on a "new" evangelization. It will embody Pope Francis' oft-stated desire for a Church that goes out from itself all the way to the margins in order to bring Christ to everyone (Bishop Robert Barren)."

Interestingly, Fr. Massimo Fusarelli, OFM, in his Letter and that of the General Definitory to the Whole Order for the Solemnity of St. Francis 2023, wrote:

"The synodal journey that the Church is making invites us to broaden listening and dialogue to overcome the boundaries of our own fraternity or of the Franciscan family, and to open ourselves to listening to the world with its cultures and realities, today so increasingly complex. In short, to learn to listen to those "outside" (the laity who surround us, the collaborators in the mission, the young, the nonbelievers and the so called "indifferent", immigrants, workers and the elderly, the voices and questions that creation poses to us, ...). What are the moments planned in fraternity to open ourselves to this 360° listening? What concrete steps can we begin to take to learn better to know, interpret and live the

reality around us, without isolating ourselves from it?"

In Jesus' message to the disciples, he didn't omit anyone from the efforts thy would make to evangelize, to spread the Good News of His Gospel message to every person on the face of the earth. "To all nations", Jesus said.

So the question is: are we listening and not just hearing random sounds — lovely though they may be. It's easy to hear sounds, words, notes, broadcasts, but it's much more difficult to listen for understanding what is being communicated. Thus, are we reading the Gospel so as to LISTEN to what Jesus is saying to us that needs to be taught and observed, or are we merely hearing the multiplicity of sounds, sacred or otherwise, around us - which have, sadly, deadened our ability to LISTEN: that is, to listen to His message of the Father's love for us, to listen to His prayer for peace at the Last Supper, to listen to who Jesus said He was, to listen to Him saying "Fear not", to listen to His invitation to "Come to me", to listen to our brothers and sisters in the midst of their pain and need, to listen to our earth which is groaning under the weight of our misuse, to listen to all that the Gospel says which we Franciscans have promised to live.

Along the way, you may have repaired numerous 'boat holes' for several people without realizing how many lives you've saved.

"Ministering"

On Tuesday, 27 June 2023, after working a double shift, I had the pleasure of meeting Kevin at the corner of Touhy Street and McCormick in Lincolnwood, IL. For a few weeks now I have been observing Kevin, a male black about 24 yrs. old, using 5 gallon buckets to drum away using his drumsticks. He would play on the corner then as the light is changing, he would stand and walk between cars asking for donations.

I must admit, I do have a bias when comes to bucket boys (a slang term used to describe individuals who use drum sticks to play on 5 gallon buckets and ask for donations.) When I worked by Wrigley Field, the calls complaining about the bucket boys were an everyday occurrence--from disturbances to harassment and as the evening went on to thefts and robberies.

So, I looked at Kevin with a suspicious eye, but what I noticed over time that he would store his buckets neatly behind the bench where he hides his backpack and keeps the area clean. Another day, I had seen him walking from the McDonald's with a joyous skip in his step and he had the look and aura of being happy.

On this day, I watched him drum away at his buckets and I noticed that he loved his music. He was so enveloped in his drumming that he resembled a musician who is entranced in their moment of music. No matter what his situation was, he had a deep appreciation for the music he was producing and performing.

I gave Kevin a monetary donation and noticed how light hearted he was. Despite his actions of asking for donations, I noticed that Kevin was happy inside. I noticed a good and humble person. So, I asked Kevin



if he would like a care package. He quickly said yes with curiosity and I then described what the contents were.

He was thrilled! He gave me much love... A word he used to describe his gratitude, "that's love," as he shook my hand.

It's not just the smile that completes my mission, but it is the learning experience spiritually that showed me how a person can remain light-hearted, happy, and enjoy the simplicity of producing music while working for donations that the act itself takes a large amount of humility for one to ask for help. Kevin was Jesus. Jesus was standing before me giving me the opportunity to connect Spirits, to acknowledge him, and to do God's will.

I am thankful that Ted gave me the care package mission with the purpose of making it personable. I am thankful that Jesus presented himself before me. I am thankful to have met Kevin and learned from him of God's message, joyous humility. Thanks be to God.
