

From our Minister SECULAR FRANCISCAN GUIDELINES*

Every morning let Jesus "meek and humble of heart" be your model, and place in Him, your Faith, Hope, and Charity.

Always keep your spirit and countenance peaceful, even when alone.

Look to God every morning for guidance as to what you can do to give aid and comfort to your neighbor.

Be prepared for occasions when you will have to restrain yourself and be ready to do so. Be ready also to forgive all offenses.

In conversation have sympathy with the faults of others and recognize their virtues. Learn to be tolerant of those who make themselves unpleasant.

Always be ready with a pleasant word, a kind greeting, and a smile, when you meet people: and do not neglect any of the rules of Christian good manners.

Defer to the opinions of others and adapt yourself to the tastes of others.

Do not be over-solicitous in your choice of recreation, where you go for a walk, what you read, what you eat, and so on.

Do not let your virtues appear distasteful in the sight of others, do not draw attention to them, and above all, do not humiliate those who do not have them.

Do not correct anyone except in a tactful way.

Do not hesitate to ask pardon after having committed an offense.

*These guidelines were given to us in the Padre Pio Fraternity to be read every day after *Morning Prayer*. I share them with you because I found them to be a very helpful way to start the day.

FROM OUR SPIRITUAL ASSISTANT

Recently, those following the *Franciscan Ordo* for the *Liturgy of the Hours* were treated to four prominent Franciscan saints whose lives have much to offer us.

Margaret of Cortona (May 16) is the first and the only of this group that is a Third Order member. She had a rough early life, being turned out by her stepmother and then living with a man and bearing their son. Her conversion began when she discovered her lover murdered. She found her way to Cortona where she lived an extreme form of penance. The local friars counseled her to moderate this and she formed a group of women tertiaries who formed a sort of hospital to minister to the sick. She had great devotion to the Eucharist and Passion of Christ.

Paschal Baylon (May 17) was a member of the First Order who lived in a century of great saints: Ignatius of Loyola, Teresa of Avila, John of the Cross and Peter Alcantara, to name a few. He was a simple shepherd who developed a strong spirituality before becoming a Franciscan. He wished not to be ordained a priest but to be a simple beggar and porter who gave away much to the poor. He was known for his long hours by the Eucharist and his image is one of the statues flanking the entrance to our Adoration Chapel in Mishawaka.

Also from the 16 century was *Felix of Cantalice* (May 18), a Capuchin brother known for his simplicity of life, spending 40 years as a questor, or beggar, for his community. He was also known for his devotion to the Eucharist, care for the sick and rigid observance of poverty. By now if you are still reading you see a theme; Franciscans see that their charism stresses **concern for the poor**, **preference for poverty** and **devotion to the Eucharist**.

The last of the group is *Bernadine of Siena* (May 20) whose life in many ways mirrored those already mentioned. But there are two things which stand out in his life. He was called from a life of contemplative living, his preference, to be a preacher who was known to convert many. And the one item of his preaching that is most noted is his love for and devotion to the **Name of Jesus**. The monogram for the name of Jesus, **IHM**, which you often see engraved on vestments and church articles owes its notoriety to Bernadine who propagated devotion to the Holy Name and to this symbol.

Each of the above, and all Franciscan saints both dead and alive, give us a model of what it truly means to live a Christ-centered life to which all Christians are called, not just Franciscans.
