Pope Francis' new prayer for the intercession of St. Francis of Assisi:

Pope Francis raises a tough but important question in chapter 8 of *Fratelli Tutti* regarding our identity as Christians. This question can also be applied to us as Secular Franciscans. The question is: how do we retain our identity in the face of differences/contradictions? This is where good formation comes in.

Good formation begins with the question: who do I understand myself to be as a Secular Franciscan Catholic Christian? This differs from what we do as Christians/Secular Franciscans because who we are determines what we do, not the other way around.

Formation is in 3 basic steps: information (what we learn); actual formation (what the information means to me); and transformation (how this leads to a difference in what I do). This is why formation is so integral in our fraternity gatherings. It is so much more than a Franciscan religious ed class or worse, a Franciscan book club. It is why everyone's presence is so important.

From the Catechism (for Fratelli Tutti, chapter 7, question 3)

2309 The strict conditions for legitimate defense by military force require rigorous consideration. the gravity of such a decision makes it subject to rigorous conditions of moral legitimacy. At one and the same time:

- the damage inflicted by the aggressor on the nation or community of nations must be lasting, grave, and certain;
- all other means of putting an end to it must have been shown to be impractical or ineffective;
 - there must be serious prospects of success;
- the use of arms must not produce evils and disorders graver than the evil to be eliminated. the power of modem means of destruction weighs very heavily in evaluating this condition.

These are the traditional elements enumerated in what is called the "just war" doctrine. The evaluation of these conditions for moral legitimacy belongs to the prudential judgment of those who have responsibility for the common good.

Fratelli Tutti Questions for Reflection

Chapter 7: Paths of Renewed Encounter

Questions

- 1. Pope Francis describes the need for both peace and healing. How are these two things related to each other? Pope Francis also addresses the need for a "penitential memory." What does he mean by this?
- 2. Define/describe forgiveness. Does forgiveness mean that past offenses, even horrific ones, should be forgotten? Why/why not? Apply your answers to both in individual and societal contexts. What do you see as the process of going from offense to reconciliation? Which article(s) of our Rule would you apply in this process?
- 3. Read article 2309 of the *Catechism* (see page 2 above). Do you believe that war can ever be justified? Based on article 2309, can you give an example of a "just war"? Can you give an example of a "unjust war"? Pope Francis asserts that "every war leaves our world worse that it was before" (FT, 261). Do you agree with this? Why/why not? After reading this section of the encyclical and the article from the Catechism, has your understanding of war changed? How so/how not?
- 4. In 1995, Pope St. John Paul II stated unequivocally that the death penalty should be universally banished. What might be the difference between judicial punishment and judicial revenge? Reread the quote from St. Augustine (FT, 265). What connections can we make between this quote and our earlier discussions on penitential memory and forgiveness? Have you ever considered a life sentence to be a "secret death penalty"? How might it be so or not be so? How does our response to the death penalty, and even prison conditions, relate to article 15 of our Rule?

Chapter 8: Religions at the Service of Fraternity in Our World

Questions

- 1. Describe the difference between *ideals* and *ideologies*. How does Pope Francis view God and hope/idolatry and hopelessness in the context of ideals and ideologies? How might articles 10 & 14 of our Rule apply?
- 2. How might you describe the role of politics in the good of society and the progress of peoples? In what ways can we engage in the political realities of life and remain true to our identity as Secular Franciscan Catholic Christians? How might article 15 of our Rule help us so that the reality becomes Church and State rather than Church vs. State? Explain Mary's role in both our Christian identity and in our political lives.
- 3. Pope Francis declares that terrorism is "deplorable" (FT, 283). While there is overt terrorism, there is also covert terrorism. What might be considered covert terrorism? What could we as Secular Franciscan Catholic Christians do to overcome this covert terrorism? How might Pope Francis' descriptions of intermediaries or mediators help us (FT, 284)? How might we use verses 10-11 of the Canticle of the Creatures serve as our inspiration? (see page 2 above)
