FROM OUR VICE MINISTER...

Are you afraid of the Bible? Or more accurately, are you afraid to read the Bible? Believe it or not, there are quite a few people who are.

Occasionally, when people find out that I'm a convert, their response is: "I think converts make better Catholics because you know the Bible so well." For the first few years after I joined the Church, I let this go. I no longer do. Now, I will respond by saying that anyone can know the Bible as well – or even better – than I do. It starts by getting it off the shelf, dusting it off, and opening it.

Then the excuses start. "Oh, no. I might misinterpret it." This is the most common excuse I get. The solution? Get a good study Bible and follow the marks and explanations. The one that makes me want to do a face-palm is: "What I hear at Mass is enough." Egads!

Our Rule makes it very clear: we are people of the Gospels – and of the entirety of Scripture by extension. Article 4 of our Rule tells us that we are to "devote" ourselves to "careful reading" of the Gospels. This is where I go to St. Clare.

In her second letter to St. Agnes of Prague, Clare tells Agnes to "gaze, consider, contemplate, desiring to imitate your Spouse." We see Jesus in the Gospels. When we gaze on Him, we look deeply at what He does; we think deeply about what He says and does; we let go of ourselves and let Him transform us in contemplation; then we imitate Him from what we have seen and considered and contemplated.

More succinctly, St. Jerome tells us: "Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ." How can we encounter Christ in the Scriptures?

I like to use my imagination.

Take the Parable of the Lost Son. Identify all the characters – all of them. Picture in your mind what they do and say. Put yourself in the story. Who are you? What is your role? In a way, this becomes a kind of self-guided mediation.

son? One of the servants? The older brother? Someone else?

An encounter with the Christ of the Gospels leads us to encounter Christ in the Sacraments, especially the Eucharist. This more deeply we encounter Christ in the Gospels and in the Sacraments, the more we also encounter ourselves because we are not separate from Christ. As the word "communion" tells us, we "at one" with Christ.

So please, if you haven't gotten your Bible down off the shelf for a while, get it down, dust it off, and open it up to an encounter with Christ.

As the Carmelites like to say: "Jesus is waiting for you."
