Readings to go with Cantalamessa's *Beatitudes*Chapter 2

The Franciscan family, as one among many spiritual families raised up by the Holy Spirit in the Church, unites all members of the people of God – laity, religious, and priests – who recognize that they are called to follow Christ in the footsteps of Saint Francis of Assisi.

In various ways and forms but in life-giving union with each other, they intend to make present the charism of their common Seraphic Father in the life and mission of the Church. - *Rule, article 1*

The Secular Franciscan Order holds a special place in this family circle. It is an organic union of all Catholic fraternities scattered throughout the world an open to every group of the faithful. In these fraternities the brothers and sisters, led by the spirit, strive for perfect charity in their own secular state. - *Rule, article 2*, *paragraph 1*

United by their vocation as "brothers and sisters of penance" and motivated by the dynamic power of the gospel, let them conform their thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the gospel calls "conversion." Human frailty makes it necessary that this conversion be carried out daily. - *Rule*, *article 7*, *paragraph 1*

Witnessing to the good yet to come and obligated to acquire purity of heart because of the vocation they have embraced, they should set themselves free to love God and their brothers and sisters. - *Rule, article 12*

A sense of community will make them joyful and ready to place themselves on an equal basis with all people... - *Rule, article 13, paragraph 2*

Mindful that they are bearers of peace which must be built up unceasingly, they should seek out ways of unity and fraternal harmony through dialogue, trusting in the presence of the divine seed in everyone and in the transforming power of love and pardon. - *Rule, article 19, paragraph 1*

Reflection Questions for Cantalamessa's Beatitudes, Eight Steps to Happiness

Chapter 2

- 1. Cantalamessa quotes the poet Charles Peguy: "Jesus...gave us living words to nourish [us] (page 19). Recall some words that particularly sustain you, eg from a hymn, Scripture, a poem, etc.
- 2. Cantalamessa spends time with the idea of pain-pleasure/weeping-laughter (pages 20-23). Recall a difficult experience when you went from weeping to laughter/pain to pleasure. Read Luke 24:13-35 (The Road to Emmaus). What are your thoughts? (Optional: Read the story about St. Francis and perfect joy from "The Little Flowers." What are your thoughts?) On the other hand, when have you wept for joy?
- 3. How might you attempt to "prove" the existence of God?
- 4. Article 19, paragraph 2, of the Rule says that we are to be "messengers of perfect joy in every circumstance" and "to bring joy and hope to others." Why do you think joy and hope are mentioned together? How might we bring joy and hope to those who have been deeply hurt? Who are the lonely/abandoned?
- 5. Tears are an important part of our faith journeys (pages 28-32). Sometimes they are tears of grief, for ourselves or for others; sometimes they are tears of repentance; sometimes they are tears of joy. Romans 12:15 tells us to "Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep." What do you think this says to us about the nature of the community of faith? Of fraternity, especially in light of articles 1, 2, 7, 12, 13, and 19?
